New Zealand councils are responsible for the ownership and operation of all public libraries in the country.

## I investigate new and innovative approaches for libraries. We've commissioned research that builds on:

- Libraries as a vehicle for service delivery, in addition to core services.
- Libraries as a vehicle for central Government service delivery.
- How the services delivered through libraries provide value to their communities including economic value.

#### // My role and current activities

I build key relationships within both the library and local government sectors, to develop strong sector links and communication, and to support the long-term sustainability of this mahi.

When I'm asked what my role is about, I respond – "it's all about advocacy."

Advocacy is "The act or process of supporting a cause or proposal: the act or process of advocating something."

When you are advocating for something - timing and understanding of the current economic and political environment is crucial.

You need to identify the right time and opportunity when you have a good chance to succeed, as often you may only have one shot at it.

#### // Advocacy and its importance for public libraries

Four things that make for successful advocacy:

- Research.
- Passion.
- Collaboration.
- Promotion.

#### Three forms of narrative

- Mobilising narratives stories that help to explain and understand impacts.
- Generating narratives stories reframing situations by translating values into actions.
- Contesting narratives using stories as a metaphor to demonstrate understanding.

# Think about your audience – and what you are wanting to achieve when you chose a way of telling your story:

- Do you want to mobilise them by gaining their understanding of the impact of the issue?
- Do you want to reframe their thinking about an issue?
- Do you want them to gain a deeper understanding of the issue?
